Having met with residents, I believe that the installation of additional traffic calming measures such as speed humps and signage will make the area safer for all road users and instil confidence in our community.

I urge the Cork City Council to take necessary action and prioritize the safety and well-being of our community by implementing additional traffic measures as soon as possible.’

As the vibrant hub of cultural and social activities, Cork City host various festivals and public events that contribute significantly to the overall vibrancy and appeal of our community. However, it is crucial that we address the environmental impact of these events and strive towards a more sustainable future.

In order to ensure that events in Cork City align with sustainable practices, I propose that event organizers be required to submit a comprehensive sustainability report along with their application. This report would outline the measures and strategies that will be employed to minimize environmental impact, reduce waste, conserve resources, and promote eco-friendly practices throughout the event planning and execution process.

By implementing this requirement, we can provide a framework that encourages event organizers to incorporate sustainable practices into their planning and operations. It will also enable the City Council to assess the environmental impact of proposed festivals or public events, allowing for informed decision-making and prioritization of sustainability.

The sustainability report should encompass elements such as waste management plans, energy consumption strategies, transportation arrangements, water conservation measures, and any other relevant initiatives that aim to minimize the event's ecological footprint. It should also outline the steps being taken to engage attendees in sustainable behaviours and promote environmental awareness during the event.’

3. Tourist experience: As an area that attracts tourists, it is important to create a positive first impression through well-designed and visually appealing signage. This will contribute to boosting tourism and attracting more visitors to Mayfield.

4. City improvement: By investing in updated signage, Cork City Council can demonstrate its commitment to enhancing the appearance and infrastructure of all its neighbourhoods, including Mayfield.’

Should replies not be received and resurfacing works done that are later undone by a utility, these should be charged back to the utility at the full rate of the initial resurfacing and redone properly. Utility providers, and most especially Uisce Éireann, need to be made understand their responsibility when it comes to monies spent by City Council that is collected through LPT. The recent issues when resurfacing Model Village in Tower cannot be repeated.’

While the new school building is very welcome, the ongoing construction and the lack of a footpath near the school poses a significant challenge in terms of road safety.’

29. **CALL FOR SPEED CONTROL MEASURES**

‘I am calling on Cork City Council Roads Department to consider the installation of one speed ramp for Silversprings Lawn, and three speed ramps for Silversprings Court.

There is a fair distance from the entrance to Silversprings Court where there are two ramps, and the ramp at South Ridge also.

The road running from Silversprings Court to Silversprings Lawn is badly needing speed control measures, as some drivers do not obey the 30 km/h speed limit.

The case for reducing the speed limit to 30 km/h is a strong one. Studies by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (via Cork City Council) found that:

- If hit by a car at 60 km/h, 9 out of 10 pedestrians will be killed.
- If hit by a car at 50 km/h, 5 out of 10 pedestrians will be killed.
- If hit by a car at 30 km/h, 1 out of 10 pedestrians will be killed.
- Reducing traffic by 40% makes our cities calmer and quieter, as well as reducing air pollution.’
